## STATEMENT.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, "GOLDENBERGS," a firm composed of Moses GOLDENBERG, JULIUS M. GOLDENBERG, and MORTON H. GOLDENBERG, citizens of the United States of America, domiciled in the city of Washington, District of Columbia, and doing business at Seventh and K streets, in said city, have adopted for our use the trade-mark shown in the accompanying drawing, the words "Play Suit" being disclaimed, for children's play suits, in Class No. 39, Clothing.
