STATEMENT.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that the GORDONVILLE ROLLER MILLS, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Missouri, and located in and doing business in the city of Gordonville, county of Cape Girardeau, State of Missouri, has adopted and used the trade-mark shown in the accompanying drawing, for self-rising wheat-flour, in Class No. 46, Foods and ingredients of foods.

The trade-mark has been continuously used in the business of said corporation since about Jan. 1st 1917.

The trade-mark is affixed or applied to the goods or to the packages containing the same, by placing thereon a printed label on which the mark is shown, or by imprinting the mark directly on said packages.
